

## A message from the Founders



I am JoAnn Reyes, President and co-founder of the Fort Worth Hope Center, located in the Stop Six community in East Fort Worth. We have served this community for the last twenty years, providing food for people and their pets, clothing, personal essentials, spiritual support, and job training.

On January 28th, 2022, I found myself in great need of HOPE. I suffered a major stroke that left me paralyzed on my right side. I was unable to speak or see clearly. I felt trapped in my own body. As I realized the seriousness of my condition, I began to lose hope of ever recovering. Day after day, I sank more and more into despair. The only thing I could do was "hear".

My husband would turn on the TV each morning for me to listen to Christian TV. One day, I was listening to a program from Andrew Wommack, teaching on HOPE. He said, "Hope is realized In our Imagination". As we see things in our imagination, we see HOPE or WORRY. It is our choice what we see. HOPE is seen in our imagination, and FAITH is the power that brings forth those imaginations. Without HOPE, faith has no place to express God's power, and faith without works is dead.

As I began to dream in my imagination, HOPE grew in my heart and I began to see a new purpose for my life. I began to see myself walking and using my hand again. I would see myself going to the park again with my granddaughter, enjoying playing with her and swinging her on the swing. I began imagining myself cooking and doing normal household chores. I imagined myself speaking at our ladies' group again.

After almost two years of HOPING in my imagination, building my faith, and putting it into action, God has given me the power to accomplish my dreams. I am using my arm and leg again. I can walk, use the computer keyboard, and feed myself again. God is my healer and He is faithful to honor the HOPE He has put in my heart.

Through this ordeal, I realized that the purpose of The Fort Worth Hope Center is to help people imagine big dream and build faith to empower those dreams. We are to teach others to trust God as He gives them the imaginations of their heart. The Bible says, "Faith is the substance of things HOPED for, the evidence of things not seen". Heb.11: 1. The Fort Worth Hope Center is a beacon of light to encourage families to HOPE and be empowered by faith as they put their trust in God.

I have had to step away from my duties as head of the organization, but God has provided a wonderfully dedicated person to act in my stead. I would not have been able to concentrate so fully on my recovery over the last almost 2 years had it not been for Ms. Donna Taylor stepping into the leadership role and helping to keep the Hope Center up and running.



Donna Taylor is the Director of Operations at Fort Worth Hope Center; as well as, a deacon and financial administrator for Without Walls Church in Fort Worth, Texas. She has faithfully served both organizations for 15 years.

Ms. Taylor has been a registered appeal agent in four counties for sixteen years and a registered tax preparer for twenty-five years. Donna recently went back to school and has completed the Non-Profit Management training and certification. In addition to being a devoted member of her church and the community, she finds time to partner with



### Thank you ARPCO!



Mr. Albert Puig and his wife Patricia founded a transport and logistics services business, ARPCO, in 1988. They arrange expedited, domestic, ocean and rail port shipments. In their domestic business, they specialize in food shipments, which is a perfect fit for partnering with food banks. Mr. Puig set up a program at ARPCO called the Affinity Assistance Program through which non-profits can apply for assistance with their transportation needs. Mr. Puig understands that it is rarely the case that people go hungry because there is not enough food-people go hungry because the food they need is located somewhere else. In his own words, "We donate the transportation services and willingly offer our time, talent and treasure to help the poor and less fortunate."

In 2023 alone, through the Affinity Assistance Program, 822,024 lbs of food and other items, with a fair market value of \$2,115,560, were transported to the Fort Worth Hope Center from across the United States free of charge. This product was then distributed to people in need in our area. Without the help of the Puig's and the Affinity Assistance Program, this would have been impossible. We are deeply grateful to Mr. and Mrs. Puig, and the employees at ARPCO.


